Robert Falconer is a Research Fellow at the School of Public Policy, University of Calgary, where he specializes in migration, behavioural policy and policy transfer. He uses experimental and quasi-experimental methods to study questions in immigration and refugee policy, civic participation and Canadian public policy. His current projects examine the behavioural effects of private refugee sponsorship on sponsors and their social networks; international policy transfer of sponsorship programs; and a new, longitudinal dataset of shelter use by more than 800,000 individuals in Toronto, including Canadian-born and refugee populations.

Robert is also a PhD Candidate in Social Policy at the London School of Economics, where he is writing his dissertation, *Essays on the Behavioural Effects of Sponsoring Refugees*. He holds a Master of Public Policy from the University of Calgary and an Honours Bachelor



of Arts in Anthropology and Religion from Trinity College, University of Toronto. Before returning to graduate studies, he worked in the immigrant-serving non-profit sector at Calgary Catholic Immigration Society, and served as Senior Research Specialist with Deloitte's Future of Canada Centre from 2022 to 2024.

His doctoral research is supported by a Joseph-Armand Bombardier Canada Graduate Scholarship from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, alongside grants from Citizens UK and a Rotary Foundation Global Grant, and he has held the Robert C. Douglas Award of the London Goodenough Association of Canada.

Robert teaches Decision Analysis at the School of Public Policy, and has supervised Master of Public Policy capstone projects on Canada's Provincial Nominee Programs, civic participation in Calgary's municipal upzoning hearings and provincial regulation of misinformation. He has also taught Research Design and the Politics of Social Policy Making at the London School of Economics.

His external work includes testimony before standing committees of the Canadian House of Commons and the Alberta Anti-Racism Advisory Council, and writing in the Globe and Mail, Le Devoir and The Conversation.
